NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE WITH RULE 3.2(E)**

PacifiCorp, d/b/a Pacific Power (PacifiCorp or the Company), files this Notice of Compliance under Rule 3.2(e) of the California Public Utilities Commission (Commission) Rules of Practice and Procedure.¹ Rule 3.2(e) requires proof of compliance with the notice requirements of Rule 3.2 subsections (b), (c), and (d) within 20 days after compliance with the last of the applicable subsections for a rate increase. The Company completed the notice to customers on May 23, 2018.

1. RULE 3.2(b)

Rule 3.2(b) requires an applicant to:

[S]erve notice to the following stating in general terms the proposed increases in rates or fares: (1) the Attorney General and the Department of General Services, when the State is a customer or subscriber whose rates or fares would be affected by the proposed increase; (2) the County Counsel (or District Attorney if the county has no County Counsel) and County Clerk, and the City Attorney and City Clerk, listed in the current Roster published by the Secretary of State in each county and city in which the proposed increase is to be made effective; and (3) any other persons whom

applicant deems appropriate or as may be required by the Commission.

The notice required by Rule 3.2(b) was served on April 26, 2018. Exhibit 1 to this Notice includes a copy of the notice letter sent to applicable Attorneys General, County Counsels, District Attorneys, County Clerks, City Attorneys, and City Clerks, as well as a list of the recipients of the letter.

2. RULE 3.2(c)

Rule 3.2(c) requires an applicant to:

[P]ublish at least once in a newspaper of general circulation in the county in which the increases are proposed to be made effective a notice, in general terms, of the proposed increases in rates. Such notice shall state that a copy of said application and related exhibits may be examined at the offices of the California Public Utilities Commission in San Francisco and in such offices of the applicant as are specified in the notice, and shall state the locations of such offices. Applicants shall maintain documentation of compliance with this subsection, and shall provide it to any person upon request.

The notice must be published within 20 days after filing an application to increase rates.

Notices were published as required by Rule 3.2(c) in several newspapers of general circulation the Del Norte Triplicate, Modoc County Record, and the Mount Shasta Area Newspapers. Exhibits 2, 3, 4, and 5 to this Notice are proof of publication for these newspapers and a copy of each notice published.

3. RULE 3.2(d)

Rule 3.2(d) requires an applicant to:

[F]urnish to its customers affected by the proposed increase notice of its application either by electronically linking to such notice for customers that receive their bills electronically or, for customers that receive their bills by mail, by mailing such notice postage prepaid or including such notice with the regular bill. The notice shall state the amount of the proposed rate change expressed in both dollar and

percentage terms for the entire rate change as well as for each customer classification, a brief statement of the reasons the change is required or sought, and the mailing, and if available, the e-mail address of the Commission to which any customer inquiries may be directed regarding how to participate in, or receive further notices regarding the date, time, and place of any hearing on the application, and the mailing address of the corporation to which any customer inquiries may be directed.

Because the Company operates on a 30-day billing cycle, Rule 3.2(d) requires customer notice within 45 days after filing an application to increase rates.

The Company included the notice with each customer's regularly mailed bill from April 25, 2018, through May 23, 2018, which was within 45 days after the date of the Application. For customers receiving bills electronically, the Company sends an e-mail notification when the bill is available for viewing online. Once the customer logs in to their account, they can see a notification on the online bill account links to an online message where bill inserts are listed for the current month. The Company sent the notice required by Rule 3.2(d) to customers electronically by making the bill insert associated with the Application available online in each customer's account. Exhibit 6 to this Notice is a copy of the bill insert mailed or made electronically available to customers.

4. RULE 3.2(e)

Rule 3.2(e) requires an applicant to file proof of compliance with the notice requirements of Rule 3.2(b), (c), and (d) within 20 days after compliance with the last of the applicable subsections. The Company complied with the last of the applicable subsections on May 23, 2018. Proof of compliance is provided in Attachment A, which is an affidavit of Matthew McVee incorporating the following exhibits:

- Exhibit 1: A copy of the notice letter sent to applicable Attorneys General, County Counsels, District Attorneys, County Clerks, City Attorneys, and City Clerks, as well as a list of the recipients of the notice letter (Rule 3.2(b)).
- Exhibits 2–5: Copies of the proof of publication for all four newspapers and a copy of each notice published (Rule 3.2(c)).

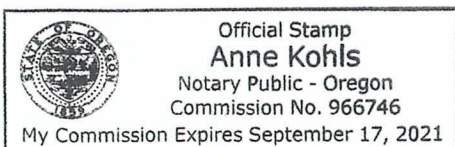

**RE: Notice of Pacific Power's Request to Increase Rates for the 2019 General Rate Case
(A. 18-04-002)**

Dear <NAME>,

On April 12, 2018, Pacific Power filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting to increase rates for its 2019 General Rate Case (GRC). If approved, the proposed rates would become effective January 1, 2019. The request is for an increase of \$1.06 million (0.9 percent) in 2019 from current revenues of \$101 million. Pacific Power is requesting this increase to invest in its infrastructure and transition to a cleaner energy system (renewable sources).

About the filing

This is the first general rate case Pacific Power has filed since 2009. Pacific Power is required to file a GRC with the CPUC for review of, among other items, the company's revenue requirement. The annual revenue requirement is the total amount of money a utility collects through rates each year, for specific purposes. The increase in revenue requested in this GRC will be used to make the following investments:

- Upgrading the system of power plants, poles, wires, and equipment needed to deliver electricity to Pacific Power customers
- Increasing safety in the operation of electric facilities
- Modernizing and strengthening the company infrastructure to support clean technology and integrate resources such as wind energy and other renewables
- Improving customer service support and providing customers with choice and control over their energy usage
- Continuing improvements of emergency preparedness and coordination with public safety organizations

The GRC does not include net power costs or greenhouse gas allowance costs and revenues. Those are addressed in Pacific Power's Energy Cost Adjustment Clause application filed annually on August 1.

How will this increase affect me?

Pacific Power is requesting an overall revenue increase of \$1.06 million, which represents an overall increase of approximately 0.9 percent to Pacific Power's California customers. If the CPUC approves Pacific Power's proposal, the revenue increase would result in the following rate increase to each customer rate schedule listed below (this is an estimated average):

A typical residential customer using 850 kilowatt-hours per month would see an increase of approximately \$2.49 or 1.9% on their monthly bill from \$142.42 to \$144.91.

CPUC process

This application will be assigned to an Administrative Law Judge (Judge) who will determine how to receive evidence and other related documents necessary for the CPUC to establish a record upon which to base its decision. Evidentiary hearings may be held where parties of record will present their testimony and may be subject to cross-examination by other parties. These evidentiary hearings are open to the public, but only those who are parties of record can participate.

After considering all proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process, the assigned Judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt Pacific Power's proposal, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon at a scheduled CPUC Voting Meeting.

The Office of Ratepayer Advocates (ORA) may review this application. ORA is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. saplings on BLM property in Modoc County.

Zack Hannah, a neighboring cattle producer in Lake, CA agreed with the use of diversified animal management by saying, "Goats like the McGarva's will be able to open up rangeland for useful perennial grasses through grazing and hoof impact."

Hundreds of proposals were submitted to the Outcome Based Grazing Initiative, but the proposal featuring Ross and Kelly's experience and large goat herd rose to the very top as one of 10 selected projects in the nation. "The significance of this recognition is that it shows there is more than one way of doing things," said Kelly McGarva. "Our goal in this project was to reclaim ground that had been lost due to invasive juniper trees and provide the type of intensive management and graz-

ing that public lands are in such desperate need of."

Unfortunately, due to no fault of their own, the McGarvas are unable to move forward with their project at this time. However, both Kunkel and the McGarvas feel like the recognition from the national selection committee is proof that land management is moving in a direction that focuses on animal diversity and innovative production models. As their herd grows and new opportunities present themselves, Ross and Kelly look forward to working alongside other ranchers and land managers to find new, regenerative land management practices that benefit the land, the livestock, and the producer.

On April 12, 2018, Pacific Power filed an application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) requesting to increase rates for its 2019 General Rate Case (GRC). If approved, the proposed rates would become effective January 1, 2019. The request is for an increase of \$1.06 million (0.9 percent) in 2019 from current revenues of \$101 million. Pacific Power is requesting this increase to invest in its infrastructure and transition to a cleaner energy system (renewable sources).

Another issue Haupt raised was the impacts on livestock owners who have permits to graze on public lands. He explained that the presence of wolves – whether or not they kill an animal – can lead livestock to cluster in one small area. The problem with that, he said, is that permit holders are often required to disperse their cattle so as to reduce negative impacts associated with grazing one small area. He said that if the rancher is not informed of the wolf's presence, he or she may not find out until the damage is done, possibly imperiling his or her permit the following year.

Mangj said that he would be open to discussing the issue with the North Coast Regional Water Quality Control Board, which enforces grazing permits, and explore the possibility of a clause related to wolf activity.

Rancher Don Meamber noted during the public comment period that some ranchers in Oregon are simply abandoning public lands grazing due to the potential impacts from wolves.

Haupt also brought up the lack of communication in the eastern part of his district, where he said wolves have been sighted in areas such as Seiad and Happy Camp without any notification from CDFW.

Stoddard shared that that is due to the extremely small percentage of wolves actually fitted with tracking collars – in recent years, only three with collars have entered the county, and he said that he expects the number of non-collared wolves is much higher. "We don't know where they all are," he said.

As one example, he referenced the "Shasta Pack" of wolves, which was the first documented wolf pack in California since wolves were extirpated from the state in the early 1900s. Currently, Stoddard said, the agency does not know the whereabouts of the pack, since none of its members have GPS collars.

Other issues that came up included the legality of protecting human life from wolves and information related to a salmon die-off in 2002.

In addition, rancher Rich Marshall criticized the department's ability to manage wolves effectively, stating that agencies in Oregon and Washington have been faltering in their management practices. "Your counterparts in Washington and Oregon have shown themselves not capable of staying on top of the wolf issue – what makes you think that you'll do better?" he asked.

Regarding self defense, Stoddard said that federal and state law allow lethal response to protect human life, but said that it is different with livestock, where the law typically requires nonlethal methods for endangered predators.

This application will be assigned to an Administrative Law Judge (Judge) who will determine how to receive evidence and other related documents necessary for the CPUC to establish a record upon which to base its decision. Evidentiary hearings may be held where parties of record will present their testimony and may be subject to cross-examination by other parties. These evidentiary hearings are open to the public, but only those who are parties of record can participate.

After considering all proposals and evidence presented during the formal hearing process, the assigned Judge will issue a proposed decision which may adopt Pacific Power's proposal, modify it or deny it. Any CPUC Commissioner may sponsor an alternate decision. The proposed decision, and any alternate decisions, will be discussed and voted upon at a scheduled CPUC Voting Meeting.

The Office of Ratepayer Advocates (ORA) may review this application. ORA is the independent consumer advocate within the CPUC with a legislative mandate to represent investor-owned utility customers to obtain the lowest possible rate for service consistent with reliable and safe service levels. ORA has a multi-disciplinary staff with expertise in economics, finance, accounting and engineering.
