# Renewable Portfolio Standard

2014 Compliance Report





Pacific Power works to serve the state and region in a responsible way. That includes reducing emissions, protecting habitats, encouraging energy efficiency and developing renewable resources.

In 2007, the Oregon Legislature passed a law to create a renewable portfolio standard (RPS) that would promote the development of new renewable resources and decrease reliance on fossil fuels for electricity generation. This law established various milestones requiring utilities to have at least 5 percent renewable energy by 2011, 15 percent by 2015, 20 percent by 2020, and 25 percent by 2025.

On June 1, 2015, Pacific Power submitted its 2014 Oregon RPS Compliance Report to the Public Utility Commission of Oregon to demonstrate compliance with the requirements of Oregon's RPS. The report indicates that Pacific Power met the 2014 Oregon RPS target

by using qualifying electricity from eligible renewable energy sources. The Public Utility Commission of Oregon approved the compliance report in October 2015. A summary is provided below:
